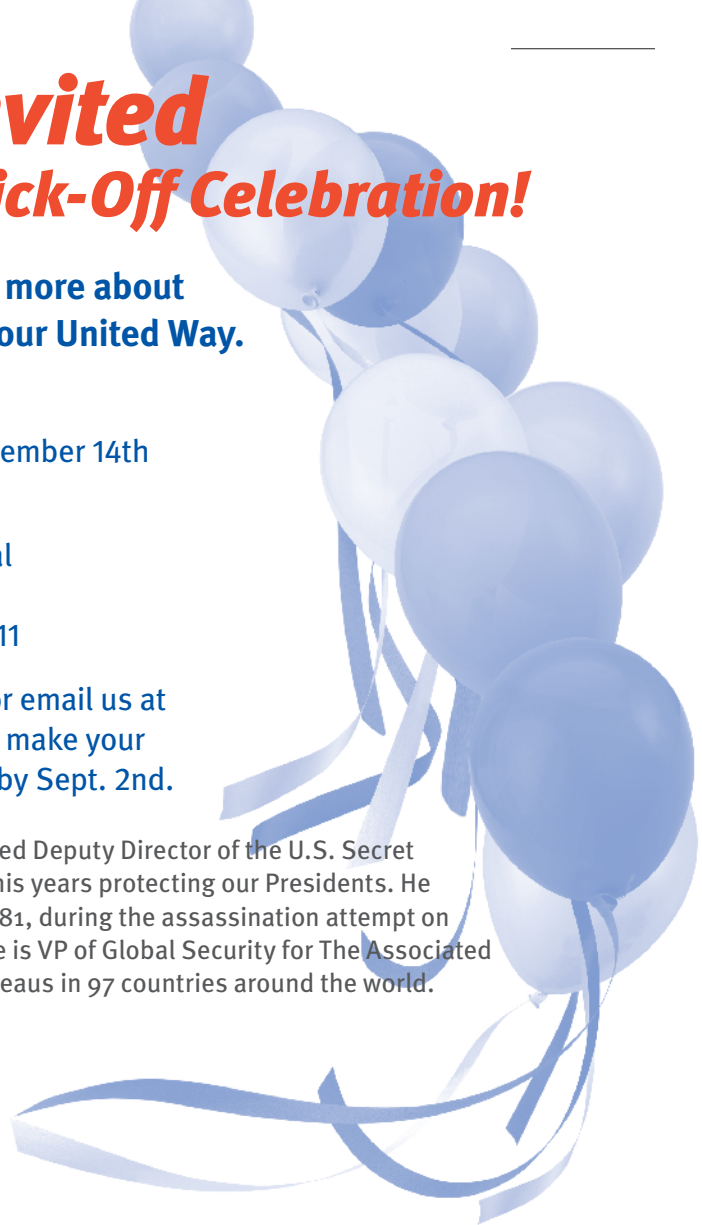

United Way has one simple mission... to improve the lives of our southern Chester County neighbors in need. With your donations, we work to move these neighbors from crisis to independence. Whatever stage of life or need, United Way is there to help and support them.

To say that our work is life-changing is an understatement. Our programs, like the Adult Literacy Program at the Bayard Taylor Library, touch more than 13,000 people each year. Meet several entrepreneurial students from the Literacy Program who have opened successful businesses in the area...

One-on-one sessions with a tutor gave Jose the knowledge and confidence he needed to take his citizenship test. Since passing that test, Jose opened his own business in 2002 and now employs 13 people.

“I came here in 1986. I never had the chance to go to high school. I learned English on the streets, but I cannot read or write English.” Jose Hernandez, owner of Greentree Landscaping, reflects on his past. “I picked mushrooms when I first came here. In 2001, I went to the library and got a tutor from Adult Literacy Program to study for my citizenship test for 3-4 months. That test has 100 questions in English, and I would never be able to pass without a tutor. I studied two hours every week.”

Before learning English, Maria* worked as a part-time school janitor and cleaned firefighters' clothes. Maria wanted more for herself and for her family and began meeting with a tutor for 2 hours every week. Learning English enabled her to go to school to be a hairdresser.

“I had to pass my classes and my licensing test in English,” Maria recounts with a smile. “I always wanted my own business. I opened my business in 2006 and now have 6 employees.” This program changed her life and she is giving back to her community by employing others.

La Michoacana, the popular and successful ice cream store in downtown Kennett Square, boasts of three of the four owners who studied English with tutors.



“I go two hours once a week with my tutor for a year and a half,” says Martha Rodriguez, co-owner, recounting the importance of speaking English. “The baby was 5 months old. We had to go to the hospital emergency room. I didn’t know English at all and couldn’t explain to the doctor what happened. It was terrible.”

“We started with a small idea.” Co-owner Juvenal Gonzalez proudly describes opening La Michoacana in 2003 and their newest venture, Michoacana Grill.

Still, three of the partners keep working on their English. “If you be able to communicate, you feel more helpful with the community. You feel good because when someone asks directions of you, you can help them get there. There are lots of tourist people needing directions. I like to help.” Juvenal is also an advocate of the program. “People I know who don’t know English, I try to tell them to go and apply for a tutor...I told my partners to get a tutor...it is a great opportunity. You have to be able to communicate.”
